FINANCE REPORT - DECEMBER 2013

In November, offerings were slightly down compared with the same month last year, however in December, figures were consistent with the previous year. Sunday and Tuesday Coffee continue to build up funds to offset against the cost of the kitchen refurbishment and we are very grateful for a further donation of £1000 towards the kitchen refurbishments. lunch club has started and funds have started to come in from this source. There was a small number of one off payments during the two months being final expenditure on the Kitchen refurbishments totalling £4408, Church roof repairs of £550, purchase of a new boiler for the manse at £1900 and new monitor screens for the church £2131. For the year offerings were down approximately £4000 from last year due in the main to the additional £3000 received from the September Gift weekend in 2012. The deficit for the year against the budget was £9500. Salary costs finished below budget and the heating costs and fabric Repairs and Maintenance costs were below annual budget. Other costs in the main are being kept below budget so far and all concerned should once again be commended for their efforts.

THE GUILD

The Guild now enters the second half of our current session, after the break for Christmas and New Year. We would like to wish all of our members a very Happy and Healthy New Year.

Looking back to November 20th, we had a visit from 2 people from Golden Charter Planned Funerals. This organisation helps people both at home and abroad, through the distribution of food and clothing, etc. December 4th was our Christmas Celebrations. This time we were entertained by Helen Kerr and friends. This was followed by a meal at the King's Park Hotel.

The second half of our session began on January 8th when our own minister, Rev Sandra Boyd, gave a presentation on her recent visit to Italy. This was most interesting, with lovely views of the Amalfi Coast, Pompeii and Rome. This was enjoyed by all who attended. On January 15th, we had a visit from Mrs Mary McIntosh, who came along to show us how to do some 'Armchair Keep Fit'. This was both interesting and entertaining. Our Annual Guild Coffee Morning will take place on Saturday 8th March in the Large Hall from 10am until 12 noon in aid of Guild funds. This will once again, be held in conjunction with the King's Park Art Club's annual Work-in, Exhibition and Sale. Tickets will be priced at £1.50 each for adults and 50p for children. Mansel Kelly 22.3.37-15.11.13

Mansel's life was always focused around his family. He was born in Maryland Street in Glasgow and brought up in Sandyhills, being the eldest son of Margaret and Bill Kelly, growing up with younger brother Ian. Mansel attended Eastbank Primary and then Secondary School was keen on football and swimming.

Mansel left school at 16 and started working with Glasgow Corporation Assessors and Electoral Registers. He worked there for 2 years before leaving at 18 to do his National Service with the Navy in Cyprus. He returned to Glasgow Corporation and the Assessors Department where he saw out his working life bar a brief spell in Policy Planning and some time in Renfrew.

Whilst travelling to work on the train, Mansel met Bunty and they enjoyed going out dancing . They were married on the 23rd March 1962, in the Reformed Presbyterian Church in Airdrie, enjoying 51 very happy years of life together. Mansel and Bunty initially lived with Bunty's mum for a while in Airdrie before moving to Menock Road and then to King's Park Avenue where they lived for 42 years.

Mansel and Bunty were blessed with Fiona in 1965 and Graham in 1969 of whom they were very proud. Mansel joined the church and was ordained as an Elder in January 1973 and with his excellent organisational skills was minute clerk to the Kirk session for a number of years.

It has been a tradition in the Kelly family that the boys would attend the Scouts. Mansel's Dad, Mansel and his son Graham too. Whatever Fiona and Graham were involved in, Mansel and Bunty got roped into helping out, like the Youth Club at the church on a Saturday night, run by elders, including the Malcolm's, Bill Coubrough and the Kelly's taking it in turns to lead.

Swimming continued to be a great passion for Mansel and with his Bronze Medallion he taught Community Education swimming two

nights a week as an instructor at Castlemilk. Needless to say Fiona and Graham could swim before they could walk, even taking his Grand-daughter Cara swimming, which she loved.

In 1995 with the demise of Strathclyde Region, Mansel retired at 58. With his organisational skills he then took up invigilating exams at Castlemilk High school where he eventually became the Head Invigilator.

Mansel enjoyed decorating, gardening and cooking and his chilli and prawn curries were famous! On retiring Mansel started playing indoor bowls at Mount Florida. Mary Smith, recognising his very good administrative skills, got Mansel involved as the Presiding Officer at Local and General elections.

Mansel was a faithful servant to Jesus Christ and will be greatly missed by all those who were touched by his life, his life finding its completion with his Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ.

May God's peace and God's strength be with us all at this time As we treasure the stories and memories in our heart of the life of a special gentleman, Mansel Kelly.

"SAINTS PRESERVE US"

St Valentine

There seems to be as many Valentines as there are chat up lines but three martyrs are mentioned in literature. The first was a 3rd century priest whom Pope Galasius honoured and on whom, it is said, that Valentine's Day was declared. The second was Bishop of Terni and the third suffered in Africa but nothing more is known of these martyrs.

A more romantic belief is that a young priest rose to distinction after betraying Emperor Claudius in 270 AD by conducting illegitimate wedding ceremonies in Rome. Claudius wanted soldiers with no ties other than the army but the priest believed marriage was in God's plan and purpose of the world. Bishop Valentine was jailed and ultimately beheaded but not before he fell in love with the jailer's daughter. He passed her notes signed 'from your valentine'. This story has blossomed into the defining tradition of St Valentine's Day.

St Valentine's Day

The Source of St Valentine's Day remains a mystery despite the comments above although Geoffrey Chaucer, the medieval writer, knew of its existence in the 14th Century. One idea is that birds paired off on the 14th of February. Another that the Roman Lupercalia festival, celebrated in mid-February, was an occasion when partners were chosen by lot - explaining the anonymity of the day (cards unsigned). There does not seem to be a connection between the martyrs and the orgy of sentiment that mark today's celebration.

Relics

Since 1835 the Carmelite Whitefriar Street, Dublin, has claimed to possess the relics of St Valentine. But there is also a shrine to him at the Gorbals area in Glasgow. While there is no way of establishing whether the Irish or the Scots are the true owners of the Saint's bones, it is hoped that the real message of St Valentine's day will not be lost. Believe whichever mystery or martyr you wish but do it in the name of love.


