WELL DONE, GOOD AND FAITHFUL SERVANTS!

Douglas McLagan and Allan Thomson pictured on the front of this magazine, have together committed over 125 years of faithful service to God at King's Park Church of Scotland, Glasgow.

Douglas was one of the first members of the 118 Boys Brigade to drop letters through the doors of the new Western Heritable homes built in King 's Park to invite those interested in starting and being involved in a new church. Having professed his faith and showing commitment in being a junior and senior Sunday School Leader, as well as Sunday School Superintendent, he was then Ordained as an elder in 1953. Douglas went on to become Treasurer in King's Park Church for the next 29 years, as well as assisting with assessing church accounts for churches all over Glasgow Presbytery for much of that time. He then took over as Session Clerk and committed a further 19 years of service to the church. On Sunday 2nd February as members of King's Park church re - dedicated themselves to serving God for another year, Douglas received a certificate and Quaich in recognition of his 60 years as a committed and faithful elder.

Allan Thomson is another backbone of King's Park Church. In December he received a certificate and Quaich in recognition of his 65 years of service in singing in King's Park Church Choir. Allan has been a committed and faithful member of our church with his memory and knowledge of the local area and people, being legendary. He has served in the printing team for 59 years, been a committed elder for 55years joining King's Park Church in 1950 and the Youth Fellowship in 1945. In February this year Allan and friends from King's Park Church organised the 49th Coffee Morning for Visibility Scotland raising just over £42,000 over the years.

Douglas McLagan and Allan Thomson's dedication and faithful service to their Lord Jesus Christ is a real inspiration to us all.

BEATSON PEBBLE APPEAL—CHARITY ZIP SLIDE

In 2008, the University of Glasgow Trust (a registered charity) set up the Beatson Pebble Appeal to fund the construction of the Beatson Translational Cancer Research Centre, the first such centre in Scotland. The building was completed in 2012 and in the spring of 2013, the first researchers started work in this state-of-the-art facility. They will be working to improve current cancer treatments and to develop new, more effective ones for a wide range of common types of the disease, including breast, prostate, pancreas and ovary. These will be specifically tailored to the needs of individual patients and hastening their use in the clinics. The Charity Zip Slide across the River Clyde on Saturday 12th April will help to raise funds to provide the specialist equipment for the centre. I shall be taking part in the Zip Slide and sponsorship from my church friends would be greatly appreciated - and calm my apprehension!! There will be sponsor forms at the front of the Church. Latest Update

On Christmas day around 100 service users enjoyed a full three course Christmas dinner with all the trimmings. Prior to the meal, around twenty five people attended the annual Christmas Day Carol Service at which Rev Graham Blount (the Vice Chairman) spoke a word of challenge and encouragement. Gratitude is extended to the many generous congregations and individuals for their monetary and shoebox donations which contributed greatly to these festive efforts.

2014 got off to a good start. The number of service users is gradually creeping up, which in one way is encouraging, as people feel the LHM offers appropriate support, but it's also sad that more people need its help. However it will continue to work and offer assistance to anyone who needs help and support.

LHM's church services are still going well. Numbers at all the services remain constant. Individuals seeking chaplaincy support have gone up slightly, especially requests for prayer.

Classes have started up again and are doing well. There has been an increase in the number of speakers of other languages attending the ESOL (English for Speakers of Other Languages) classes two days a week. The Beginners class is particularly busy with an average of 12 students attending each class. In addition, the learning centre open sessions have been very popular allowing all service users to gain free internet access and the opportunity to improve their IT skills.

We look forward to a busy time ahead. Please continue to hold the work of the Lodging House Mission in your prayers.

“SAINTS PRESERVE US”

Saint Andrew Saint Andrew is the Patron Saint of Scotland, among others, whose symbols in art include the Saltire Cross and fishing nets. He was an apostle and martyr, was Christ's first disciple and his feast day is the 30th of November each year.

Andrew's Life He was born between AD 5 and AD 10 in Bethsaida, the Principal fishing port of Palestine. His parents were Jona and Joanna; his brother was Simon. Jona along with his business partner and his friend Zebedee and his sons, James and John, was a fisherman. Andrew would have gone to the synagogue school at the age of five to study scripture and then astronomy and arithmetic. Later on the banks of the Jordan, Andrew met John the Baptist. He was the first disciple and brought the boy with the loaves and fishes to Jesus before the feeding of the five thousand. He is said to have travelled to Asia Minor and the Black Sea, where, in the city of Synope he suffered great hardship. However, he returned twice more to Asia Minor and Greece, even travelling as far as Hungary, Russia and Poland. In Greece, Andrew forced his way through a forest inhabited by wolves, bears and tigers. In Greece (Patras) he was given the choice of being offered as a sacrifice to the Gods or scourged and crucified. By his own request his cross was diagonal where he hung for three days, fixed by nails and ropes round his hands and feet. Even in his last agony he continued to preach. So ended the life of Saint Andrew.

Andrew's Characteristics Andrew was an ordinary working man, the type Jesus chose as “fishers of men”. Their qualities were those that made them good fishermen. They needed patience, perseverance and courage when the going was rough and an eye for the right moment to cast their nets. What Andrew lacked in social standing, he made up for in human attributes as would turn him into an effective Apostle for Christ. He heard Jesus' prophecies about the Last Judgement and the need to follow the Holy Paths of righteousness. Andrew was one among many who joined ranks with the itinerant prophets of the time

Relics

According to legend, a figure by the name of St Rule obeyed what he believed to be divine instructions in a dream, and carried Andrew's relics from Patras, to village in Fife called Kilymont (later St Andrews which became a pilgrimage site).

The Scots have always considered St Andrew as "their own" from Robert the Bruce, William Wallace and Mary Queen of Scots. The Saltire was carried in battle and there was even a Saint Andrews coin issued by Robert II and a Bawbee Scots halfpenny marked with the cross.

Saint Andrew seems to have been a worthy disciple of Christ, and it is, hopefully, because of this that he is revered in Scotland.

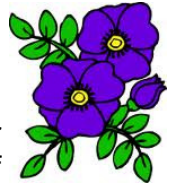

HOW WELL DO YOU KNOW THE WELL?

The Well, Multi-Cultural Advice Centre is situated in Govanhill – the most diverse community in the whole of Scotland. It exists to: **“serve our multi-cultural neighbours holistically, and enable others to do the same”**. **The Well’s** roots go right back to 1963!

The Board of Home Mission of The Church of Scotland, recognised that Glasgow had many immigrants from the sub-continent. As a church with responsibility for every parish, the Church of Scotland invited the Rev Emmanuel Johnson to come from the Church of Pakistan, to live and work among the Pakistani Community of Glasgow. Part of Emmanuel’s work was to set up a bookshop in Allison Street in Govanhill, a place where people could read and purchase Christian literature.

When it became obvious that the bookshop was no longer fulfilling its purpose, it was sold and the Church of Scotland commissioned the community worker to carry out a needs’ survey. The response was clear, when people were asked what they wanted and how the Christian church could serve them, they replied that they needed somewhere to get information and advice. And so **The Well, Asian Information and Advice Centre** began in March 1994.

The name **“The Well”** was chosen, as in John 4, Jesus had an encounter with a woman at a well. He was a Jew and she a Samaritan. Cultures and other boundaries were crossed and the woman went away with living water. Men came. Women came. Young people came. Older people came. All found the same commitment among the staff and volunteers to offer the best help that they could.

Why? Why would people choose to come to a Christian based project, instead of going for help in their own community? Quite simply because **The Well** is **not** a part of their community! In February 2010, as a part of its own restructuring process, the Church of Scotland’s Mission & Discipleship Council decided that the time had come for **The Well** to become an independent charity. This finally happened in May 2011. **The Well** decided to change its name to reflect the changes in the community that it serves, and so, on the 10th May 2011, **The Well, Multi-Cultural Advice Centre** was officially born.

All the staff and volunteers of **The Well** are followers of Jesus and active members of their local churches. Our vision comes from the fact that “We believe God’s great plan is to bless all peoples of the earth through Jesus the Messiah. He calls His people into partnership with Himself in His purpose. In response, **The Well** seeks to be a blessing to our neighbours from all over the world.”
