**FROM THE MANSE**... Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing.

Dear Friends,

When we've been hurt by someone, the last thing we might think about is praying for that person. Most of

us are more interested in focusing on some kind of justice so that the offending person will have to pay for the hurt or damage he or she has inflicted. But not Jesus.

Jesus, who had done nothing wrong, was brutally beaten within an inch of his life. His head was pierced with a crown of long, thick thorns. His skin slashed, nails driven through his hands and feet. His cross was dropped into a hole in the ground. He hung there naked and humiliated, for all the world to laugh at and scorn. The way they crucified him is horrifying beyond what we can imagine. Yet as Jesus is hanging on the cross and dying in agony, he prayed for the men who were killing him. "Father, forgive them, for they do not know what they are doing." Luke 23: 32-34

Such amazing forgiveness and love is hard to fathom.

As we look at the injustices in our lives, how do they compare with what Jesus endured? If he could forgive his torturers, surely we can choose to forgive too. Some of us have very deep wounds that may require time before total forgiveness is worked in us. But in many cases that we've experienced, we can decide to let go of them quickly and completely and choose to forgive those who have hurt us.

The good news is that we can ask God to help us forgive. We can ask him to show us his perspective in the matter. We can pray to him to help us remember what Jesus endured and be able to say, "Father, I forgive them whether they knew what they were doing or not. I forgive them, not because they deserve it, but because I want to be like You."

This Holy Week and Easter as we journey with People of the Passion to the Cross and empty tomb, perhaps we can reflect on Christ's forgiveness of us and demonstrate something like that forgiveness in our lives.

Thanks were expressed to all involved in the running of the Church - to the Clerk, Mrs Jacqueline Coleman and all other members of the Board for brining their business acumen to the ongoing work of the Church.

# **CONGREGATIONAL FINANCE**

"We Give Thee But Thine Own"

The annual budget has been set to provide a reasonable challenge based on Income and Expenditure from 2013.

Expenditure decreased last year and the budget has been amended to reflect a 'flat cost' budget (ie no increase on last year's figures).

Budget for income reflects last year's figures with the exception of Offerings, Gift Aid and Use of Premises which remain constant albeit the actual figures for 2013 were well below budget. This is the challenge for all trustees this year, to try to improve income to meet these budget targets and maintain other income and expenditure at last year's level.

If we achieve these targets we will make a small surplus of circa £1.5k.

That said offerings for the first two months are already circa £25k down against budget, which reflects on the Gift Aid figure and Use of Premises is circa £500 down against budget.

So a lot of work is required to bring these areas back to budget and maintain the levels required.

After the large deficits of the previous few years we have a chance to stem the outflow of funds and it is up to all of us to play our part in trying to meet this budget.

# Madge Paterson - 13.04.20 - 27.02.14

Madge certainly lived all 93 years of her life to the full and that life always revolved around her family, friends and the church, with her Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ at the heart if everything she did.

Madge was born in Rutherglen on the 13<sup>th</sup> April 1920, the only child of John and Meg Paterson, they were a very close family sharing a very special relationship. Madge went to school at Stonelaw Primary in Rutherglen, even after the family moved to Kingsacre Road when Madge was 9 and then onto Rutherglen Academy. Holidays were special family occasions and they enjoyed going to many sea-side towns like Prestwick, Arbroath and Carnoustie together.

Leaving school at 14, Madge studied shorthand typing at Allpress College in Queen's Drive and her first job was with accountants Thomas Smith and Sons in Buchanan Street, before moving to Spillers Flour where she was secretary to Mr Moriarty, the general Manager of Spillers for Scotland for 30 years. When Mr Moriarty was made a director in London he created the job of Welfare Officer for Scotland for Madge. She had to learn to drive in her 50's, and travelled all over Scotland, speaking and visiting people, which was right up Madge's street. She thought it was great; she got to do what she loved doing and even got paid for it! She retired from Spillers when she was 60.

Madge also put those secretarial gifts to good use in the church as church secretary to both Rev Jim Hosie and Rev Stewart Smith, with Jim Hosie describing Madge as his rock, helping him in so many ways especially when he didn't have an assistant.

Madge lived in 303 Kingsacre Road for 76 and half years before moving into King's Park Mews in 2006 which she said was the best move she ever made.

Madge always played a very active role in the church throughout her life attending Sunday school and Bible Class as well as Seaside Missions. Madge read in the Citizen that Rev Robert Paterson was being introduced to King's Park Church by the Rev Tom Allan. She really would have liked Tom Allan to have been minister but if Robert Paterson was good enough for Tom Allan he was good enough for Madge and so she joined King's Park Church in 1950 from Rutherglen Church in Dennistoun.

Madge became Senior Sunday school Teacher, secretary of the Literary and Debating Society, and joined the Ladies Badminton Club and was then encouraged by Barbara Drummond's mother to join the Guild, when Mrs Grant was president. She went on to become the Guild's visitor before Mairi MacDonald took over, but remained a keen member. On the 24<sup>th</sup> April 1977, Madge was ordained as one of King's Park's first lady elders by Rev Jim Hosie. Rev Stewart Smith also encouraged Madge to order and collect Daily Reading Notes for members of the congregation, a job she was still doing at 90. Madge was also a very faithful and committed member of the Prayer group.

Madge travelled far and wide with the King's Park Holiday Club and for many years looked forward to her annual trip to the Keswick Convention with her dear friend Cathie Shearer, meeting up with Bob and Nan Pitman, enjoying worship with 2,500 others in the large marquees.

Madge's favourite hobby was bowling, being a member of the West of Scotland Indoor Bowling Club as well as King's Park Bowling Club, then Kingswood Bowling Club, along with good friends Anne Proudfoot, Jessie Rhind and Isobel Miller and she still enjoyed going to watch the bowls with Jenny Kane.

Modestly she would agree that she was alright at bowls, winning the Club Championship once, however she said that was because others were away on holiday. To most of us Madge has always been there. She was a loving, warm and caring lady. She was a people person.

Madge was a very active and independent lady, reaching out to anyone in need, visiting others. If Madge was your friend, you had a friend for life. Friends were the family that she chose for herself. Madge lived her life, following Jesus' commands to the letter – Loving God with all her heart and soul and mind and loving her neighbour as herself. She was a very committed, loyal and faithful servant of Jesus Christ and it is because of that rock solid faith, her absolute belief in her Lord and Saviour, I feel certain that she is reunited with her Mum and Dad, and many friends in heaven.

Amen and thanks be to God, as we treasure the stories and memories in our heart of a unique and special lady, Madge Paterson.

# Lodging House Mission – LHM – Love Hope Meaning The LHM Church Building 1864 - 2014

In 2014 The LHM Church building celebrates 150 years of being in existence having being completed in 1864. There is a memorial plaque in the LHM which shows that the minister at that time was the Reverend Alexander Wallace D.D. (1857 – 1893). Reverend Wallace was remembered as an "Eloquent preacher, author, poet, popular lecturer and temperance reformer, whose name was a household word in the East End of Glasgow."

The building was designed by Haig & Low and has an impressive façade in the style of an Italian Renaissance palazzo and could originally seat 1400. Design details include: Cinquecento, but some neo Greek details, two stories, 5 bays, the outer shallow advanced with giant Doric pilasters, plain pilaster strips to other bays, triple doors and first floor windows all round arched, windows all corniced, horizontal strings threaded behind giant order, deep entablature with parapet. The building is of local significance to the Glasgow area and has a B listing.

Galleries and seating were removed from the ground floor during 1932 – 1933.

Service users of the LHM know the place as "Trotters". John Trotter was Chaplain from 1958 until he retired in 1977. Due to the combination of the good work that John Trotter carried out over an almost 20 year period and having a surname which is perhaps easier to remember than the official name Lodging House Mission, the name Trotters is still used by service users up to the present day!

During 2014 LHM hopes to mark the occasion of the 150<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the building by holding a special event. Plans are still in the early development stage and we will keep you informed of any arrangements made to mark the occasion.

It is quite a thought to realise that the site of the current church building has been in use as a place of worship for over 200 years!

I recently came across the above banner when looking up some images on the topic of pastoral care and would, first of all, like to thank all those people who have shown me so many of these qualities recently and during my time as Pastoral Assistant here in King's Park...

It's probably fair to say that the role of Pastoral Assistant has continued to evolve during that time, incorporating exciting new avenues of service, including my role as part of the chaplaincy team at Stonelaw Secondary, and more recently King's Park Secondary, where we are involved in taking assemblies, and church services as well as working with staff and pupils which has allowed me to build on the long established connections with the local primary schools.

I always look forward to my lunchtime meetings with the pupils at King's Park and Bankhead Primary (in their temporary premises at the old Spittal Primary, as they await the development of their brand new school on the site of the existing school). It's good to get to know the children and with Sandra and I alternating between the two schools, spending time with the children over lunch week by week lets the children get to know Sandra and I as part of their school life, as well as from the Pathfinders and Brownies, where many of them attend regularly, and gives us the real privilege of seeing them develop through the school and now, with the new chaplaincy roles, on to Secondary. I hope, too, that I have been able to share some of these qualities not only with the young people but across the wider fellowship.

As the number of people in our congregation who are unable to get along to church as regularly as they would like grows, it's my privilege, together with members of the pastoral care team, to bring the church to them. I look forward to keeping them up-to-date with what's going on in KP, sharing in prayer, hearing the often fascinating, as well as humbling, stories of their past service to the church and their lives in

general. Visiting them in the homes they have lived in for so many years, or perhaps playing a part in helping them adjust to new surroundings elsewhere, whether for the short or perhaps the longer term. There's often no better way to get to know someone than sharing a journey with them, whether taking them on a visit to somewhere significant in their past, or down the coast, or even, when transporting them to the hospital or some other appointment.

Over these past few years I have certainly become quite adept at finding my way around the wards in the Victoria, and Mansion House Unit, or the clinics in the new building, and have even managed, on occasion, to find a parking space in the sprawling edifice that is the Southern General while visiting folks there. It's always a happy occasion when someone's spell in hospital is over and they can return home to their loved ones. Sadly this is not always the case and there have been a growing number of funeral services, to be conducted by Sandra or myself. I also share in the very great privilege of accompanying someone and their family during the final stages of their life. Although always sad, these occasions may be the only time we come in contact with some members of the wider community, and it is a real privilege, and responsibility, to share these difficult times and to be there to support them not only on the day itself but in the weeks and months that follow.

As the church seeks to become more involved in the life of what is the ever changing area that is King's Park, so my own role has meant becoming more involved in new ways of supporting those around us, like setting up the D Café for those with memory issues, dealing with social services or the council on behalf of a young family, trying to guide a recently released prisoner through the maze of forms and benefit claims to help ease him back into the outside world – just being there for them.

It is sad to think that there is a real need for Pastoral Care in today's society, but with elderly parents who have children abroad or spread throughout the country it falls upon the church to help in these small but significant ways to remind people how special they are to God. I'm sure that I have made more than a few mistakes along the way but I just wanted to take the chance to say thanks again for all your support as we journey together in King's Park Church. # "SAINTS PRESERVE US"

## Saint Cuthbert

As we continue our series of Saints with some connection to Scotland we turn our attention to St Cuthbert who is the patron Saint to sailors, shepherds, watermen and is protector against plague and whose feast day is 20th March each year.

# Cuthbert's Life

Cuthbert was born in 636 AD in the vicinity of Melrose. He grew up as an orphaned shepherd, tending sheep on the hills above the Abbey. The young Cuthbert may have been influenced by the monks of nearby Melrose Abbey in his choice of vocation; when he was sixteen he received a vision of St Aiden being carried to heaven by angels. This vision may have convinced him to enter Holy Orders at Melrose which he eventually did and where his devotion earned him high praise. In 664 Cuthbert became Prior of Melrose after the death of Biosil. In that same year the Synod of Whitby settled the ongoing dispute between Roman and Celtic Christianity in favour of the former. Cuthbert agreed with the Synod's decision and adopted Roman rule. He was sent to the Priory of Lindisfarne to ease the transition to Roman tradition in that house. He spent a great deal of time at Lindisfarne evangelising among the people and exercising the tact and patience for which he was renowned. Cuthbert, however, desired the peace of a life in contemplation and in 676 AD the Abbot granted him leave to retire and take up the life of a hermit on the Farne Islands off the coast of Northumbria. After several years of austere life in Farne, Cuthbert was reluctantly persuaded to return to a more active role in the Church and became Bishop of Lindisfarne. During his return to the Church he would walk long distances visiting the sick, especially when the "yellow plague" hit the country, miraculous healing was associated with his name. But his time was short and two years later on 20th March 689, he died.

# Cuthbert's Legacy

The shrine of St Cuthbert was one of the most popular places of pilgrimage. His bones had to be secreted several times by the Monks due to plundering, although now are recognised as resident in Durham Cathedral. In his honour the Gospels of Lindisfarne were commissioned. This illuminated manuscript was produced by Eadfrid, Bishop of Lindisfarne, in the 8th Century and is one of the best examples of Celtic calligraphy. The story goes that the Gospel was lost overboard in the Irish Sea and a vision of St Cuthbert appeared and told them where to find the book.

The Gospel (now in the British Museum) was later analysed and marked with stains apparently from salt water. A little known Saint, Cuthbert's short life was full, both historically and religiously.
