## **FROM THE MANSE...** *What gift has God given you?*

Dear Friends

As you will no doubt be aware each May we have been focusing our attention on the National Stewardship Programme, which the General Assembly has been encouraging every congregation in Scotland to participate in. It works in a 3 yearly cycle looking at Time, Talents & Money. In 2014 our Stewardship Season will be focusing on **TALENTS**. We will be looking in depth at: *Matthew 25:14-30, The Parable of the Talents*. Here the Master divides the talents, or money, among his servants according to their abilities. The Talents represent any kind of resource we are given. God gives us time, gifts and other resources according to our abilities, and he expects us to invest them wisely until he returns. We are responsible to use what God has given us. The issue is not how much we have, but how well we use what we have.

So following the example of many other congregations, on Sunday 8<sup>th</sup> June, Communion Sunday, our treasurer Niall Kinloch will be giving out £10 to anyone who wants to put it to use, using it wisely to realise some money for the church. You should use the gifts God has given you; e.g. having a coffee morning in your house, cut the grass or do people's gardens, baking to order your speciality, making cards, washing cars, having a Garden Party, typing up people's Christmas Card lists, taking people on an outing, baby-sitting, a sponsored walk/run etc.

The list is endless and only limited by our imagination. You then have until Communion Sunday 14<sup>th</sup> September to accrue as much from your £10 as you can, not just from folks within the church but asking your neighbours or people at your place of employment. This is not a competition; the church is the only winner.

As we face yet another year of financial difficulties, this is our opportunity for each of us to do our part. Put your thinking cap on and work out what gift God has given you and how you can build his kingdom through using them.

**CHRISTIAN AID WEEK 2014 11 - 17 MAY**

During Christian Aid Week 2013 in King's Park, the house to house collection, which is the mainstay of our CAW, saw a return of just over £2900! That was a lot less than the previous year.

It would be great to reverse that trend, wouldn't it? Since 2005 our collection area has included over 2800 houses. To visit every house we need over 60 collectors; last year we only had 28 collectors, which, for a church this size, with such a committed membership, was pretty disappointing – no surprise the total was down!

To offer the people of our parish the opportunity to give, we need to provide as many of them as possible with Christian Aid envelopes... and to do that we need collectors!

## **“SAINTS PRESERVE US”**

So, the series on the lives and legends regarding Saints mainly connected to Scotland comes to an end. We cannot really include Saint Patrick who, apparently was born somewhere between the Severn and the Clyde and who is given the credit for driving snakes out of Ireland of whom he was Patron Saint. Other Saints of the United Kingdom, which are well-known, are Saint David (Wales) who was reputedly either an uncle or nephew of King Arthur; Saint George (England) who again reputedly tamed then slew the dragon in the cause of Christianity and whom the George Cross medal is named after.

Other Saints we, as Christians, know well are the Apostles; Matthew; Mark; Luke and John, whose histories of Christ can be found in the New Testament. Their patronages respectively apply to accountants, Venice, doctors and theologians/writers.

Finally, other saints whose names are often mentioned are - Saint Cecilia (music), Saint Christopher (travel) and Saint Anthony (poor, helpers and lost articles).

All the Saints discussed in the last eight issues of the magazine suffered hardships, often of their own making, in the name of Christ. Every place where Christians could be found would have a Patron Saint to protect and guide the daily lives of its inhabitants. Their blessing was affirmed by reports of miracles connected with the Saint's tomb or relics. To be considered for Sainthood the four Cardinal virtues of prudence, temperance, fortitude and justice must be displayed alongside the spiritual virtues of hope, faith and charity. How do we “measure up”? In hymn 740 the important lines in verse 1

“For all the Saints who from their labours rest  
 Who by faith before the world confessed  
 Thy name, O Jesus be forever blest  
 Alleluia! Alleluia!”

Let us confess thy name and reiterating the song we started with:  
 “Well, I want to be in that number,  
 When the Saints go marching in”.

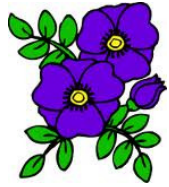
