FROM THE MANSE... Moderator calls for unity



The Moderator of the General Assembly is calling for unity among the Scottish people following the record 84.6% turnout in the referendum vote. The Right Rev John Chalmers hopes people will come together to celebrate the success of the democratic process. In the coming days, he is calling on Scots to pledge to work with one another and move the discussion on from "US and "THEM" to only "US".

Speaking after the result of the poll the Moderator said: "Today I particularly care about those who feel as if they are on the wrong side of this outcome. So, I expect those on the winning side to go out of their way to avoid triumphalism and to be inclusive in their plans for Scotland's future, and to take the time to assure those who are anxious, disappointed and down that they understand how they must feel."

"Let's take heart from the fact that the people of Scotland have shown in overwhelming numbers they are ready to discuss their future aspirations. Let's keep it that way and not hand the game back to the professional politicians to do it all for us." We stand at an important moment in the life of our nation; individuals with contrasting feelings: some will be elated and some will be desperately disappointed. The result is a triumph for some and a defeat for others, and it will take a force of magnanimity and graciousness to find a way of harnessing the energy of opposing sides and bringing it to bear on a shared future.

There is, however, an extraordinary opportunity here; for, when the parties to any dispute decide that it's time to move on; and particularly when those who have been opponents decide to pool their resources and work together - then something extremely powerful can happen.

In the Bible there is a potent story about twin boys named Jacob and Esau; early in the story the first born, Esau, sells his birth-right to Jacob for some bread and soup and then some years later Jacob snatches his father's blessing from under his brother's nose. When Esau finds out he is described as "seething with anger against his brother". But Jacob is warned by his mother that Esau is out for vengeance, and so he flees. These two brothers begin a life of distant estrangement.

There is little in the story that follows to prepare you for what happens next; for while we may be familiar with the parting of the ways of Jacob and Esau, we are less familiar with the story of their reconciliation.

Fate was to bring the two of them back together. Now, in anticipation of their meeting Jacob was deeply fearful; but when the meeting with Esau actually took place, Jacob discovers a magnanimity which allows difference to be set aside and a grace that puts vengeance away; remarkably - Esau runs to meet him, throws his arms around his neck and they weep.

And then - Esau says, "Let us journey on our way, and I will go alongside you".

There may be very little in the story of this campaign to prepare us for the idea that opponents might now agree to travel alongside one another, but I sincerely believe that fellow Scots to fellow Scots will offer such grace to one another. The untold energy of people who love Scotland and care about its future has been used on both sides of this debate. Neither side promised 'utopia' or 'unity' but now that it has been settled we have to find a way of harnessing all that energy. And, make no mistake about it, such magnanimity will release enormous creativity and Scotland's future will be safe.

Money coming into the Church during August was £13,245 whereas money paid out was £16,729. One off annual costs in August include CCLI fees £686 and the FWO donation envelopes £288. Also four monthly costs for Presbytery Dues of £1,644. Stewardship Initiative unused funds for £1,590 were returned to the bank account.

Kirk Session & Congregational Board

For the first time, the meeting of Session and Board was held on the same night. This is to allow business to be transacted without any delay. It was a successful trial, completed to time and sets the scene for the immediate future. After the Kirk Session had rededicated itself for a further year, the main topic for discussion was the intention to hold a Congregational Convention, for all ages, using the history of the Church as a guide to benefit the future.

The Congregational Board welcomed two new members, Faye Walker and Kath Graham. We wish them both every blessing as they continue on their journey of faith in Kings Park. The Board discussed the financial and property aspects of the Church. The former can be found in the magazine elsewhere. The latter was mainly concerned with security, refurbishment and repairs within the Church environment with value for money being the main criterion. It was also agreed that a new computer for the office be sourced, this would be appropriately financed from Isabel McPhedran's legacy money.

Ian Thomas McDonald McCulloch
18.11.32 – 14.7.14

He was a true gentleman, loving, kind and caring. He was easy going and gentle. He would help anyone and was loved by everyone. Ian's smile just lit up a room, being happy and contented with life.

Ian was born on the 18th November 1932 in Rotten Row Maternity Hospital here in Glasgow, to Mark and Helen McCulloch. He was the youngest of 5 sons, growing up with elder brothers Duncan, Robert, Mark and David. They lived in Ibrox and used to peep over the wall to watch the then Mighty Rangers play.

Tragedy struck the family when Ian was only 7 years old, with both his parents dying within 6 months of each other. David and Ian went to live in Quarrier's Home in Bridge-of-Weir. Quarrier's, Edith Christian made a big impression on Ian, teaching Ian to bake and clean the cooker after him. Ian was very proud of being Dux Medallist of Quarrier's school. At Christmas, Easter and Hallowe'en, Ian would return to Cottage 33 in Quarrier's, to help arrange any party by the Old Boys, their wives and family, treating the children who were living in Quarrier's to fireworks, sweets and presents. In fact it was one of the first places Ian took Margaret to visit when they started going out, explaining who the house parents were and who lived in each cottage.

At 16, Ian left Quarrier's to go to Drumbreck Road, and from there he got his own house in Carnarvon Street. Ian started working with Harland and Wolfe in the shipyards as an apprentice electrician. Whilst at an open air Gospel Meeting in Sauchiehall Street, Ian met a young lady dressed from head to toe in green, including a green feather in her hat. Ian walked Margaret all the way from Sauchiehall Street to Rutherglen and as he had missed the last tram back had to walk all the way back into town too. Ian and Margaret got married on the 17th July 1953, in Woodlands Road Church of Scotland. Ian and Margaret enjoyed 60 very happy years of married life together. They went overseas on honeymoon ... to Rothesay! and then set up home in Carnarvon Street. In 1952/53 Ian went to do National Service, stationed firstly in Colchester and then to Cyprus being a Royal Signal Man.

Ian and Margaret were blessed with a beautiful daughter, Marion in March 1955, of whom they are very proud. Ian qualified as an electrician but when Marion was 5 Ian was paid off and got a job with the Prudential Insurance, where he was an agent for a few years. When the shipyard's strikes hit, Margaret went out to work as a cashier in McLachlan's the Butchers. As Margaret worked on a Saturday Ian and Marion would have the day out, travelling to Rothesay, Ayr and all over.

For Ian and Margaret's 25th wedding anniversary the family had a gathering in Stewarton and Ian and Margaret went to visit Ian's elder brother and sister-in-law in Canada, which was a fantastic holiday. They also enjoyed umpteen holidays abroad, travelling to Spain, Greece, Italy, Sicily, Malta and New Zealand.

The family then did a house exchange to Princess Street and then to Fernhill in Rutherglen. They bought their first house in Barrhead in 1967. They then bought a farm cottage in Stewarton, having a dog called Flash which Margaret got at a Tupperware Party! From here they moved to Paisley then Cambuslang before settling in Kingsknowe Drive in 1995.

Professionally Ian moved back to the shipyards to Alexander Steven's and then onto Yarrow's in Scotstoun, before taking early retirement.

Ian's faith has always been central to his life, becoming an elder in King's Park on 21st February 1999 being faithful and committed in his district in Curtis Avenue and Bankhead Road. He has been an active member of the choir for 12 years, a member and secretary of the Men's Carpet Bowls, the 4M Club as well as helping Alan Thomson photocopying the Church Magazine.

He also managed to fit in being a member of Overtoun Bowling Club and was a past Master of St John's Lodge 347.

For Ian and Margaret's Golden Wedding Anniversary they renewed their vows on the Bridge of a Ship with the Captain in the Mediterranean. Their Diamond Wedding last year was arranged by Marion, Bob, Craig and Gail, in Old Meldrum. They then enjoyed two days at the Hilton in Dunkeld with Marion and Bob.

Ian will be greatly missed by all those who were touched by his life, especially his many girlfriends, his life finding its completion with his Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. Amen.

WOMEN OF THE BIBLE

Ruth

Unlike Esther who was a woman of great power, Ruth was a more ordinary person who followed God even though the nation of Israel was abandoning God. Her story took place during the period of the Judges when Israel faced moral decline, foreign attacks and national chaos.

Ruth (a friend) was a Moabitess, the wife of Mahlon, whose father Elimelech, had settled in the land of Moab. On the death of Elimelech and Mahlon, Naomi came with Ruth, her daughter-in-law, who refused to leave her, to Bethlehem, the old home from which Elimelech had emigrated. There, she had a rich relative, Boaz, to whom Ruth was eventually married. She became the mother of Obed, the Grandfather of David. Thus Ruth, a Gentile, is among the maternal Progenitors of our Lord (Matt 1:5). The story of "the gleaner Ruth" illustrates the friendly relationship between Boaz and his reapers, the Jewish land system, the method of transferring property from one person to another, the working of the Mosaic Law for the relief of distressed and ruined families; but, above all, handing down the unselfishness, the brave love, the unshaken trustfulness who, though not of the chosen race, was, like the Canaanitess Tamar (Gen 38:29; Matt 1:3) and Rahab (Matt 1:5), privileged to become the ancestors of David and the son of "Great David's Greater Son" (Ruth 4:18-22).

Book of Ruth

This book was originally a part of the Book of Judges, but it now forms one of the twenty-four separate books of the Hebrew Bible. The history it contains refers to a period perhaps one hundred and twenty six years before the birth of David. It gives (1) an account of Naomi's going to Moab with her husband Elimelech and of her subsequent return to Bethlehem with her daughter-in-law; (2) the marriage of Boaz and Ruth; and (3) the birth of Obed, from who David sprang.

The author of this book was probably Samuel, according to Jewish tradition. "Brief as this book is, and simple as is its story, it is remarkably rich in examples of faith, patience, industry and kindness, nor less so in indications of the care God takes in the trust of those who put their trust in Him". Worth a read.
