

Looking back over the past 18 months I realise that God has been very much active in my life, especially personally in the diagnosis, treatment, care and death of my Dad in January this year. His

diagnosis of oesophageal cancer was a shock to us all and accepting and dealing with this wasn't easy. Don't we all think that our parents are going to live forever? Taking time to reflect, I realise that God was with us every step of the way. Logistical arrangements were difficult, as travelling to the Western General



Cancer Hospital in Edinburgh for Radio Therapy or stays in Edinburgh Royal Infirmary weren't exactly on our door step. But every time there was a problem with organising lifts for treatment or overnight stays, a meeting was cancelled, someone from Brucefield Church or a friend volunteered to help. Juggling full-time ministry and regular visits home to Whitburn was extremely challenging and visiting members in similar situations was difficult too but with God's Spirit encouraging and strengthening us we can face these most difficult times and come through them. One of the most difficult things I have ever done was reading my Dad's Tribute at his funeral, because he asked me to. Whilst doing that I knew I was being upheld by God because I wouldn't have been able to do this under my own somewhat limited strength. I am eternally grateful to those members of the congregation who made the time to come through to Whitburn for the funeral facing the "beast from the east".

Rebekah Nolt writes in her poem The Will of God- The will of God will never take you, where the grace of God cannot keep you... This is God's way of making TIME for the things that are important in life, and often we only realise these in hindsight. So I encourage you to reflect on your life but also to grasp the opportunities that God provides for us in our lives every day through using our TIME to serve him in many ways both in our family and in God's family too. Time is precious but time used to further God's kingdom is never a waste of our time.

KIRK SESSION AND CONGREGATIONAL BOARD NEWS

This report includes information from the last three meetings.

KIRK SESSION

The meeting in April was charged to consider the Elders' Role in seeking to serve Jesus Christ in the 21st Century, as a Kirk Session and as individual Elders in King's Park. Three important principles for today were discussed in workshops—Working as a team, A people called and chosen, Spiritual Role.

For data protection purposes, scrutiny of the Roll will take place to review records kept by the Church. This is a legal requirement. Presbytery is to arrange training events and urges Kirk Session and Financial Boards to send representatives. Ideas as to the content of a History of our Church to be displayed in the South Transept are requested. Please speak to your elder if the muse hits you.

As in previous years, there will only be one service during July and August. Presbytery's Inspection of records for King's Park took place in April. Our next Burns' Supper will take place on 26th January 2019. A donation to support Pastoral Care and to fund new youth support group was received. Thanks were received for donations to the Guides and Boys' Brigade.

PRESBYTERY

The Reverend Ada McLeod's Ordination to Hurlford on 7th June will be attended by Wilson Paterson and Raymond Jenkins, whose short reign as Interim Moderator of Toryglen comes to a close with the appointment of Reverend Sarah Brown of Castlemilk. This will be a reminiscing visit for Wilson, as it was his Father's first charge.

There is a pressing need for members of Presbytery in conjunction with Congregations to face seriously the challenges concerning the structure of the Church in ten years. The Church should be imaginative and creative and to this end a conference to address these issues is anticipated in the Autumn. The Presbytery met in five different venues across the City in April to discuss "Wellbeing" in the Church in its various forms, so there was no formal meeting. Congregations should consider more flexible use of all their premises including the sanctuary. Consideration should be given to allow approved elders and others to lead worship. Presbytery commended the work of Schools' Chaplaincy.

BOARD

FINANCE: The latest report can be found elsewhere in this issue. The review of salaries has been agreed. The report from Gift Aid indicated an increase in the third quarter due to a generous donation.

PROPERTY: The routine maintenance of our property continues under the auspices of our Convenor. The basement has been cleared to a skip and thanks go to Bill and Janet Troop for their assistance. Ninety Nine chairs have been sold. A property manual containing relevant contact numbers and instructions for heating (to optimise utilisation), the alarm system and time switches is to be held in the office for reference. As no Council Grant was available the purchase of a defibrillator would be delayed until August. Work has been carried out on the audio system and purchase of new microphones considered. Usage of halls by organisations to be reviewed to optimise income.

Lawson Boyd has resigned as Property Convenor, although prepared to remain on the property team. If there is interest in this position please talk to Sandra or Carol Moore.

FIRE ALARM!

It was agreed at the Congregational Board that instructions should be available to those using Church premises, including private lets, regarding the action in event of fire including the Assembly Points. These are currently available on the wall of the halls. But it was felt further emphasis was required. The fire regulations also state that regular fire drills should be carried out by the congregation and organisations. This is a legal requirement.

PLACES OF THE BIBLE - The Spread of Faith

Caesarea (of Palestine)

This is a city on the shore of the Mediterranean on the great road from Tyre to Egypt, 70 miles north west of Jerusalem at the Northern extremity of the Plain of Sharon. It is not to be confused with Caesarea Philipi, 120 miles north of Jerusalem; the northern limit of our Lord's Ministry and where He asked the guestion of his disciples "Who do People say that I am?" (Matt 16:13 and Mark 8:27). Caesarea was built by Herod the Great (10BC) and was the capital of the Province of Judaea, headquarters of the Roman Troops and seat of Governors. It was the great Gentile City of Palestine with a spacious artificial harbour and many splendid marble buildings. It was here that Cornelius, the Centurion, was converted through Peter (Acts 10:1-24) and thus, for the first time the door of faith was opened to the Gentiles. Philip, the Evangelist, resided here with his four daughters (Acts 21:8). From Caesarea Saul (Paul) sailed for his native Tarsus when forced to flee from Jerusalem (Acts 9:30) and where he landed when returning from his second missionary journey (Acts 18:22). It was here he remained a prisoner for 2 years before his voyage to Rome. It is now in ruins and inhabited by wild animals and described as the most desolate city in all Palestine.

The Word and therefore, the Faith, was thus spread through Paul's introductory letter to the Romans, focussing on the need for salvation; a new Life in Christ and Christian conduct. This letter was probably written in Corinth. When Paul stayed in Ephesus, the Church in Corinth was doing badly, returning to idols and condoning immorality. He reiterated the Church Life and Worship. Faith was confirmed through all his epistles and his friends and fellow believers such as Timothy, Titus, Barnaby and Apollus.

This series, has hopefully identified some of the major places where the conception and change in conception of faith took place, through the Old Testament to the birth, teaching and death and resurrection of Jesus. Faith has spread in its various forms, till today we, as Christians determine our meaning of faith and our individual recognition of its place in our lives.

SAINT'S ALIVE!

In church recently I noticed the window dedicated to St Oswald. Both the window and our neighbouring church made me realize I did not know much about him so I researched his history, and while I was doing that I also researched St Giles, St Vincent and St Michael. The following is a thumbnail description of each.

<u>St Oswald</u> was a King in Northumbria who, while in exile, travelled to lona. When he regained his Kingdom he fought for Christianity and helped found Lindisfarne Monastery. Oswald is unusual in that he was made a Saint while still alive.

<u>St Giles</u> was a hermit Saint from Athens, born circa 650 ad. He is the Patron Saint of Edinburgh in addition to Patron of cripples and lepers. He was a man well thought of and popular in the middle ages.

St Vincent apart from being a street in Glasgow, which was named after Sir John Jerul's victory in 1747 off Cape St Vincent in Portugal, which in turn was named after a 4th century martyred lberian deacon.

<u>St Michael</u> was an archangel protector of the Jewish people, a guardian of the Roman Catholic Church and the Vatican City. A beautiful Church in Linlithgow is named after him as is the Marks and Spencer brand.

There must be many others that are used in conversation, St Mirren for instance, so maybe later.
