STEWARSHIP 2023 - Gift Weekend 28th & 29th October 2023

Further to Stewardship announcements, which you'll have read in the last two issues of the magazine, we can confirm that our last 'Gift Day' in King's Park was in November 2017!

In 2018, the Stewardship topic was 'Time', and in 2019, the Kirk Session agreed at it's January meeting, that we would look at our 'Talents'. Everything was put aside though, as Sandra moved to pastures new and we concentrated on maintaining normality within a vacancy situation.

Normality disappeared completely in March 2020 when the church closed due to COVID restrictions, and again our focus had to be on surviving. Right through the pandemic times with the loss of income from hall lets, no physical offerings initially, as the sanctuary closed, and the need to resort to online worship, saw our income reduce, although the church family did rally round, moving to standing order etc to regularise giving, or making sure FWO envelopes were posted or delivered to the church building itself.

So, strictly speaking, our planned Gift Weekend, taking place on Saturday & Sunday the 28th and 29th October 2023 in normal circumstances should have been three years ago!

It's difficult to address the financial side of our Christion stewardship at this time, but unfortunately, we are seeing the deficit currently facing us, increasing as the year progresses. Cost of living increases affect the church as well as each and every one of us. Our membership has dropped – in the December 2017 magazine it states the number of communicants on the roll as 555. The number of members on the current roll is 402. That's a drop of 27.5%, a drop which unfortunately isn't replicated in the costs of running and maintaining the church buildings etc.

Over the past year or so, during the energy crisis, with rising gas, oil and electricity prices, the church has benefitted from being on a fixed tariff for energy, agreed between the energy suppliers and the national church.

Unfortunately, our fixed tariff for electricity ends at the end of September, and the rate for gas, in March 2024. The General Trustees, the property holding arm of the Church of Scotland, advises that the newly negotiated contracts will see an average cost increase of 98% for electricity and 105% for gas.

"I am the church, You are the Church, We are the church together" - Yes, the church is indeed its people, but it is also a much loved building, with sanctuary, halls, and fabric, which it is our responsibility to maintain and care for. Accordingly, please do prayerfully consider your Christian giving at this time and support our stewardship responsibilities if you are able.

We'll play a little "real" royal music, like Handel's 'Music for the Royal Fireworks'. We'll feature some fictional characters like Princess Merida from Disney's film 'Brave', and some rock music like Queen's 'Bohemian Rhapsody'. Some links may be so tenuous, there could be a prize for the first person to work them out! Tickets are on sale now from the Town Hall box office and online. We'll also hold our annual coffee morning in the Large Hall on Saturday 11th November, where there will be a short performance from our Junior Band. All are welcome to come along!

Mr Robert Coleman, 20th March 1947 – 4th July 2023

Robert certainly filled all of his 76 years of life with rich and interesting things. He was always determined to live life to the full and that life revolved around his wife Jacqueline, his family, his friends and his faith. Robert was born in Queen Mary Avenue in Strathbungo and enjoyed a happy childhood growing up in Giffnock, with mum Annie, dad Edward and twin sister Elizabeth, before moving to Boyd Street in Govanhill. After attending Victoria Primary, Robert went on to Allan Glen's school where he attained the history prize (or so he always told grandson Jacob, who shared Robert's love of history.) Leaving school, Robert moved to Bedford where he began learning the printing trade at the Gordon Fraser Card factory.

Sadly, Robert's dad Edward passed away with Robert returning home to Boyd Street, to be with his mum and sister Elizabeth, where he decided to take a temporary job as a conductor "on the buses". Robert went about his job as a conductor with a bit of a swagger for the girls, but was always a stickler for the rules and that's why a young Jacqueline McNamara, whose father was also employed on the buses, found herself ejected by the over- zealous Robert who counted six people on the platform as opposed to the five who were permitted. Not one to bare a grudge, it was only a couple of years later that they met again socially, at a work's dance where they enjoyed each other's company. And so began their travelling courtship with Jacqueline joining conductor Robert on the number 2 route from Toryglen to Knightswood, then back again – with Robert making sure Jacqueline paid the right fare on every trip! Romance soon blossomed and on 2nd February 1975, Robert and Jacqueline were married in St Margaret's in Oatlands. In March 1977, the happy couple were blessed with the arrival of daughter Yvonne and in the November the family moved to Brownsdale Avenue in Rutherglen and in October 1988 the family was complete with the arrival of son Jonathan.

Having moved to Westhouse Avenue in 1999, where the door was always open to Yvonne and Jonathan's friends, the family soon became involved in King's Park Church with Yvonne going through the Brownies and Guides and Jonathan joining the Pathfinders and then the Boys' Brigade while Robert and Jacqueline both became elders, playing a full part in the life of the church.

While Jacqueline became Clerk to the Board, Robert was involved in the Pastoral care group where he always enjoyed a chat with the members he visited and they always looked forward to his visits. As well as standing in for the church officer on occasion, Robert was a keen member of the gardening squad and was more than willing to lend a hand around the church where required. Robert always made time to place a cross in our Garden of Remembrance each year to remember those in his family who sacrificed their lives for others.

In February this year, Robert and Jacqueline celebrated their Golden wedding anniversary and throughout those 50 years of marriage they continued to enjoy each other's company. Robert had not enjoyed the best of health for some time, but throughout his illness, he never complained, never questioned "why me?" – always thinking of others before himself.

Sadly, on the 4th of July he passed away peacefully, and for Robert all pain and suffering are over and he is at rest.

Robert will be sorely missed by all those whose lives he touched within this church and far beyond. He lived his life following Jesus' commands to the letter – loving God with all his heart, soul, mind and strength and loving his neighbour as himself. And because of his unerring faith we feel certain that his life finds its completion, reunited with those who have gone before and with his Lord and Saviour, Jesus Christ.

May the Lord Bless him and Keep him,
May the Lord make his face to shine upon him,
and be gracious unto him,
May the Lord lift up his countenance upon him,
and give him peace.

And May God's peace and God's strength be with us all at this time as we treasure the stories and memories in our heart, of the life of a very special, humble, gracious and faithful man, our dear friend, Robert Coleman.

SAIDIANA WOMEN PROJECT (KENYA)

Dear friends, I am sending the latest report from Saidiana. It's gratifying to read how their work is expanding. Thank you to all of you who support that work with your donations and prayers. It is, yet again, time for submitting our report for the first half of 2023. It's not been an easy time, given the sky-rocketing costs of living which we suppose is a global problem. However, it's more hard-hitting in both developing and underdeveloped countries. Kenya is in the 'developing' bracket and indeed, in the past six months, we have had a fair share of the hard times. Worse still, is the political uncertainties we are currently experiencing in the country.

Half Year Highlights: In the first six months of 2023, the activities undertaken included sewing and hair dressing school, sewing and knitting proper, micro-credit and empowerment, relief supplies, HIV/AIDS care, Gavin's Mill and water harvesting. More emphasis however focused on putting in place vital structures that would lead to the establishment of Saidiana rescue/safe homes centre for the vulnerable groups in society, particularly targeting women and children in crisis.

School of Sewing and Hairdressing: Our 2023 class with 15 students is ongoing and we look forward to its successful completion toward the year end. The 2024 class is enrolling and it's interesting to note just how fast the numbers are growing. As mentioned in our last report, we are planning to donate four sewing machines to those students most deserving in the year, thus enabling them a new start in life. Our simple sewing machine costs, on average, the equivalent of £200, thus we're looking forward to spending roughly £800 to help four families start on a journey towards self-sufficiency in day-to-day life.

Sewing and knitting: We brought forward some good stocks of finished goods from last year - mostly school uniforms, so our volunteer teams in the production side of things reduced in number to just five. Other teams remained engaged in the marketing of the finished goods. Given the high costs of living being experienced, this business-orientated activity realised just enough to keep the volunteer teams busy, but with only measured profits. Our stocks are now sold out having achieved fairly thin profit margins. In the next six months, we shall be doing much the same, though this time round, we will embark in the production of mixed garments, rather than just school uniforms.

Micro-credit and Empowerment: We are back to the cycle of empowerment both in farming and otherwise. Under this twin activity, the eligible families, mostly women, receive help, guidance, counselling, and financial services. The last six months saw fifteen families benefit from the project. Nine were helped financially whereas six were supported in buying and selling. Areas of concentration in this respect included dealing in chickens, vegetables, used clothing and charcoal. We are happy to mention that in this activity, we see women transforming their lives and their families, thus impacting their communities positively.

Relief Supplies: Food security has been an issue in Kenya this year and both the print and electronic media have been revealing very worrying trends, namely, demonstrations against the government to lower the costs of living. Accordingly, our relief programmes centred on the supply of food items to vulnerable groups in the villages, the ratios given to families depending on the level of need.

HIV/AIDS care: Four volunteers worked with seven families - mostly in visiting, to give moral support and encouragement. Affected families normally seek such support and we are always ready and happy to stand in the gap. We believe God comforts us to make comforters, not just to makes us comfortable (2Cor 1:1-6)

Water Harvesting: Saidiana plans to build housing units to serve as safe homes and thus refocus on the water and sanitation for the planned centre, though it's yet to begin. We are currently identifying and collecting the necessary information and resources to enable drilling of water from the ground. We look forward to partnering up with others in order to achieve this, given the costs of drilling. Our prayers are that God will touch others to feel obliged to help with this project for the very vulnerable groups in local communities. The building work is set to begin in 2024 and shall be opening up space for volunteers willing to participate both locally and internationally.

Gavin's Mill Gifts: Under the Gavin's Mill assignments, we supported the community in the following areas

- As mentioned earlier, under the 'Micro-empowerment' heading, the last six months saw us engaging with fifteen families – investing a total sum, equivalent to £1560.
- With regard to the School of Sewing and Hairdressing, the main expenditure supporting the fifteen 2023 students relates to a stipend paid to the instructor in a sum equivalent to £600. Students at entry normally receive a sewing kit donated by friends of Saidiana in Canada – thanks go to Patty & Rick Sinnamon. One sewing machine has been purchased, the first of four, planned to be presented to the most deserving students at the end of the year. We have the next six months to raise the remaining £600!
- We distributed a variety of seeds, ie maize, vegetables and fruits seedlings, at a total cost equivalent to £600. This is a 'revolving' activity whereby the beneficiaries give back seed money for use in the next season.

Conclusion: *As indicated in our report for the second half of last year, plans are in process to build the Saidiana rescue/safe homes centre, starting in 2024. The centre will be tasked with rescuing women and children facing crisis, reuniting children and families, restoring hope via education, business opportunities, parenting skills and spiritual guidance. The end result being the renewal of dignity among families and young adults in the area. We hope to be able to lift such vulnerable families from lives of neglect, and positively impact the surrounding area for future generations.*
