

SAIDIANA WOMEN'S PROJECT (KENYA)

Dear Friends, I am pleased to be able to send you the Report (below) from Kenya for the first half of 2014. You can see how well they are doing in all aspects of their work. Than you to all of you who keep supporting the work. Sort Code 11-47-05 account number 00005903. Fridah assures me that the money we are able to contribute is worth ten times as much in what it can accomplish in Kenya. Water Harvesting Not much was done in this area during the 1st half of the year due to the fact that the project is undertaken on 50/50 basis between the beneficiary and Saidiana Women's Project and where it is taking time to complete, means that the beneficiaries may have had other priorities given financial hard times in the country. However, we have continued to encourage participants on the importance of having within easy reach clean domestic water sources.

<u>Sewing & Knitting/Marketing of Finished Goods</u> The first half year on average works out as marketing period for our finished goods and indeed we sold out reasonably well. Secondly we have already secured tenders to supply college uniforms for the academic year beginning September and still seeking others. We hope to move upwards in this area in the coming months.

Micro-Entrepreneurship Saidiana Women's Project has moved upwards in providing the much needed shoulder to cry on for the rural communities in terms of assisting participants gain sustainability in food production and indeed lack of food on the table being a major set back for many of those families. As a result those families are now able to put food on their table and indeed move further into income generating for the much needed cash for family use in other areas such as seeking medical attention whenever required as well as pay school fees for their children.

This year Saidiana is working with 24 beneficiaries out of which 16 are basically in peasant farming/kitchen gardening whereas the remaining 8 are engaged in both food production and direct income generating activities.

We did report in the 2nd half year 2013 on the project's plan to officially work towards becoming a micro-finance entity and indeed good progress may be realized soon and come next year, we shall seek official documentation from relevant government department to operate so.

<u>Coach House Alternatives</u> This simple approach is making a lot of difference with mostly what we may term kitchen gardening but whose benefits go beyond the kitchen. We are currently undertaking a simple research to make it work even better.

HIV/AIDS—CARE We are sad to mention that in the first half year, Saidiana Women's project lost the fight when one of it's victims passed on leaving behind a wife and family. We are still caring for the wife and family. He care Saidiana Women's project normally undertakes is so important given that in many cases, such victims would on a monthly basis get some supplies from government health institutions but not enough to carry them through. This is where we come in handy; to provide the much needed encouragement and supplementary provisions of good and medicine for the opportunistic infections common to HIV positive cases. We are happy to observe the confidence gained by our subjects that they are able to look forward to life and the pleasures life brings just like any other person would do.

Relief Supplies Much of the relief supplies have been in the area of medicine for those under our care, food supplements, school fees for two students of whom one is at College undertaking clinical medicine and the other one at High School, as well as clothing to needy families.

<u>Conclusion</u> Saidiana Women's project remains simple in its approach but indeed focused and robust in meeting the challenges of those we are privileged to have come across. We are however, challenged that given the sufferings out there, we can do more.

WOMEN OF THE BIBLE

Esther

She was the Queen of Ahasuerus, and heroine of the book that bears her name. She was a Jewess named Hadassah (the Myrtle), but when she entered the Royal Harem she received the name by which she henceforth became known (Esther 2:7). It is a Syro-Arabian modification of the Persian word satarah, which means a star. She was the daughter of Abihail, a Benjamite. Her family did not avail themselves of the permission granted by Cyrus to the exiles to return to Jerusalem; and she resided with her cousin Mordecai, who held some office in the household of the Persian King at "Shushan in the Palace".

Ahasuerus (Xerxes) having divorced Queen Vashi, because she wouldn't obey him, chose Esther to be his wife. Soon after, he gave Haman, the Agagite, his Prime Minister, power to kill all the Jews throughout the Persian Empire. By the interposition of Esther this catastrophe was averted. Haman was hanged on the gallows intended for Mordecal (Esther 7); and the Jews established an annual feast - Purim - in memory of their deliverance. This took place about 52 years after the return - the year of the great battles of Plataea and Mycale (BC 479).

Esther appears in the Bible as a "Woman of great piety, faith, courage and resolution; dutiful daughter, obedient to her father's counsels, and anxious to share the King's favour for the good of the Jewish people. She obtained favour by all who looked on her." (Esther 2:15). That she was raised up as an instrument of the hand of God to avert the destruction of the Jewish people, and to afford them protection and forward their wealth and peace, in their captivity, is also manifest from the Scripture account.

Book of Esther

Authorship unknown but after the death of Xerxes in BC 465 and possibly by a contemporary of Esther - around 444-434 BC. This book is more purely historical than any other book of Scripture; and it has the remarkable peculiarity in that the name of God does not appear from first to last.

The name may not appear but observers say "His hand does". The book wonderfully exhibits the providential government of God.

Notes

Esther contains the longest verse in the Bible, Esther 8:9. It is 88 words long.

Xerxes threw a party (banquet) that lasted six months.

Esther had a year of beauty treatments to get ready for the King (Esther 2: 12-13).

The Persians had an excellent postal system. The Empire was divided into 20 satrapies (provinces) interconnected by a postal system begun by King Cyrus around 535 BC.

Hanging was probably not as we know it. The body would be impaled on a stake and hung publicly for display. Romans adapted this method to develop executions on crosses.
