Comments:

Stewardship Initiative returns of £3,529 were received during the month. One off costs in September include WiFi connection for one of the Church Halls £70, the deposit for the replacement CCTV system £500 and a new hoover for the Church £136.

The year to date income versus cost figures show that income is $\pounds 25,911$ greater than costs. This is due in main to one off income from Legacies ($\pounds 38,000$) and the Stewardship Initiative ($\pounds 3,321$). Taking into account the church running costs year to date are currently $\pounds 15,410$ greater than regular income received. This means that weekly costs are $\pounds 385$ more than income.

The Finance Committee

Kirk Session & Congregational Board

The Session discussed the optimum use of our halls, both physically and financially - to be determined after consideration in the near future. At this stage the Session were assured that Church Organisations and Community Groups already using our halls would not be asked to pay large sums of money. The Minister indicated that she has been appointed Interim Moderator at Eastwood Church from January. The Presbytery discussed online repercussions on Data fundraising and the Protection. Consideration is to be given as to the style and number of services in the Church considering poor attendance at evening services and afternoon Communion. Support for Food banks is requested by the Presbytery as an anticipated increase in demand is expected at Christmas.

The Congregational Board discussed the Financial Report. The major topic, however, was the Property Report on the heating of the halls and Church after the discovery of a major leak in the pipes. The work is underway but there is a considerable cost of Methods of raising the appropriate amount is to be repair. undertaken by the Finance Committee. Other heat losses in the Garth area are to be rectified by plastic sheeting over the windows in the corridor. This along with the lagging of some of the pipes was agreed by the Board. In addition, replacement of lighting is to be trialled - LED lighting and two new security cameras would be installed. It was hoped that this would deter those climbing onto the roof to steal lead, which had become a recurring problem. Health and Safety needs to be upgraded, with fire drills, alarms training and the appointment of a Fire Officer being discussed. The next AGM of the Church will be held after the morning service on 22nd March 2015. Volunteers are requested to help maintain a clean and well kept kitchen as these can be inspected at any time.

David Gordon 22 March 1921 - 12 September 2014

David was a true gentleman, loving, kind and generous. When David committed himself to something or someone he did it whole heartedly. He paid attention to detail, being



meticulous in everything he did. David was a very proud family man, family was everything to him.

David was born on the 22nd March 1921 in Maxwelton Road in East Kilbride. He grew up with Sister Joey and parents David and Cissy Gordon. The family then moved to new housing in Crofthill Drive in Croftfoot, where David was one of the first pupils to attend Croftfoot Primary school. He then went on to attend King's Park Secondary and in 1930 to 1934 David attended the 118 King's Park Boys Brigade Company in their Wooden Hall. He left school at 14 and started work in 1935 in the Co-op Printing Department whilst also attending night school studying Book Keeping. He worked there until 1941 when he joined the City of Glasgow Police as a constable in the Eastern Division. When war broke out David volunteered, joining the British Army, where he rose through the ranks to become Colour Sergeant. He travelled all over the world, to Singapore, Malaysia and India. It was during the war in 1944 that a young lady, Hilda Black, while dancing at the Albert Ballroom met a handsome soldier. David and Hilda enjoyed a lovely first date on the bonnie banks of Loch Lomond. David returned in 1946 resuming his position in the City of Glasgow

Police Force. He was promoted to sergeant where he worked in Govan.

David and Hilda got married in 1949 at Forsyth Memorial Church, enjoying 64 very happy years of married life together. When they first got married they lived in digs in Croftfoot, before moving into a Police House in old Shettleston, where they were blessed with a beautiful daughter Catherine in 1950.

The family then moved to Kingsheath Avenue in 1952 and David was persuaded by Bill Hogarth to go along to the Men's Association in King's Park Church. David became heavily involved in the Men's Association, becoming Chairman and loved being part of the end of year shows with David and Annie Davidson and Danny McNair.

In 1954, David and Hilda were blessed with a wonderful son Sandy. The family enjoyed many holidays to Millport or Port William and as Hilda came from Wigtownshire, to Scarborough and Blackpool.

David was also interested in bowling and played in Overtoun Public Park on a Wednesday night during the summer, before then joining Kingswood Bowling Club, followed by West of Scotland Indoor, where he was the treasurer for 11 years.

At the age of 40, in 1961, David had an epiphany, finding God through the fellowship of the Men's Association with David's faith playing a central part in his life. He was wholeheartedly committed to serving God after that, attending worship regularly, becoming an elder in 1970, faithfully serving God and his district in Curtis Avenue well for 44 years. He would pick some of his district up on a Sunday morning and bring them to church. He was a committed member of the Literary and Debating Society from 1964 to 2004.

David returned to the Eastern Division as Inspector, then Chief Inspector, before finally moving as Superintendent, to Marine Division stationed at Whiteinch. David retired from the Police force when he was 50 and in the same year joined the Ministry of Defence, in the Army Vetting Unit, travelling all over the world; Hong Kong, Singapore, South Africa, Cyprus, Northern Ireland, during the troubles, Benbecula, anywhere there was British Troops. David retired from paid employment finally in 1986 when he was 65.

David and Hilda flew to South Africa to greet the arrival of granddaughter Emma in 1974 and again in1976 to grandson Brian. David then volunteered as a driver with Chest, Heart and Stroke Scotland from until1992 as well as at KPC.

David was a true family man, dedicating his life to them as well as living his life following Jesus' commands to the letter – loving God with all his heart, soul, mind and strength and loving his neighbour as himself. David will be greatly missed by all those who were touched by his life, his life finding its completion with his Lord and Saviour Jesus Christ. Amen.

DID YOU KNOW.....


KP Church has evening services on the first and second Sundays of the month. I wondered whether people had forgotten that, because recently the turnout has been very poor.

WOMEN OF THE BIBLE

The Prophetesses

Anna was an aged widow, the daughter of Phannel. After seven years of married life her husband died, and during her long widowhood she daily attended the Temple Services. When she was eighty four years old, she entered the Temple at the moment when the aged Simeon uttered his memorable words of praise and thanks to God that he had fulfilled his ancient promise in sending his Son into this world. Anna then spoke about the child that was to set Jerusalem free (Luke 2:36,39).

Deborah was the wife (woman?) of Lapidoth. Jabin, the King of Hazor had, for twenty years, held Israel in degrading subjection. The spirit of patriotism seemed crushed out of the nation. In this emergency Deborah roused the people from their lethargy. Her fame spread far and wide. She become "Mother in Israel" (Judges 4:6, 14; 5:9) and the "Children of Israel came to her for Judgement" as she sat under the palm tree "between Ramah and Bethel". Preparations were made under her direction to throw off the yoke of bondage. She summoned Batak to take command of the army. With his aid she organised these men, gave the signal to attack and the Hebrew host rushed to a great and decisive victory. A memorable day in Israel. In Judges 5 the "Song of Deborah" is recorded which she wrote in grateful commemoration of that great deliverance.

Huldah was the wife of Shakum. She was consulted regarding the "Book of the Law" discovered by the High Priest Hiligath (2 Kings 22: 14-20; 2 Chronicles 34: 22-28) who was entrusted with the purification of the Temple. Huldah passed a message from the Lord to the effect that he was going to punish Jerusalem for their indiscretions (Pagan Worship).

Miriam was the sister of Moses and Aaron (Exodus 2: 4-10). Her name is prominent in the history of the Exodus (Exodus 15:20). She took the lead in the Song of Triumph after the passage of the Red Sea. She died at Kadesh during the second encampment of that place, towards the close of the wanderings in the wilderness and was buried there (Numbers 20:1)

Another interpretation of Prophetess simply meaning "Prophet's Wife" and has no other connotations.
