

## FROM THE MANSE... Rio Olympics!

Dear Friends,

I wonder how many of us are feeling just a wee bit weary these days, having stayed up late at least a couple of times over the past couple of weeks watching the excitement of the Olympics unfold. After all the



controversy of state sponsored drug programmes and protests about the cost of the games, both of which are issues to be addressed on another day, it was thrilling to watch as four years of preparation came to fulfilment for every one of the 10,500 athletes taking part from 206 countries around the world. Many of us wondered when team GB announced their target of 48 medals, to follow up their success in London 2016.

But behind that impressive haul of medals, that puts us second only to the USA, lies a whole lot of blood sweat and, I'm sure, tears as well. Not just for the athletes, but for the unseen faces of the teams that support them. The physios, the trainers, the nutritionists, the sports psychologists, not to mention family and friends, who are there to ensure that each of the competitors can fulfil their true potential as individuals, and as an integral part of team GB.

Nowhere was this more obvious than in the Velodrome, as team GB swept the boards, and where for every Jason Kenny or Laura Trott, there was an army of engineers, mechanics, technicians, making sure that everything was geared to success. From the costumes they wore, the bikes they rode and even the fixings on their pedals, nothing was left to chance. But no matter the planning, no matter the preparation, no matter the determination, as well as all the successes there can be set backs too. Like Jason Kenny there can be false starts, when, even for a moment, everything can seem lost and somehow we have to find a way to put them behind us and to come back stronger.

Not everyone could win a coveted medal, of course, but for me there were so many winners who didn't quite make the podium. Like the radiant smiles of the two young athletes from North and South Korea as they posed together for a "selfie", the bitter conflict between their two countries forgotten, if only for that moment.

Whether in the velodrome, on the track, in the gym, on the court or on the field, every one of those taking part was determined to play their part, however small, however obscure – proud to be part of the team, proud to be an Olympian.

As we approach a new session, I trust each of us will find a part to play in the on-going work of God's church here in King's Park – proud to be part of Team KP, proud to be a disciple, a servant and part of our Lord's chosen people!

#### Comments

Offerings show a 2% increase on June last year, however are 1% down on last year as at end of May. Hall Hire income received during the month was £685. The surplus of income over expenditure for the calendar month was £5,352. First rental income for Church Officer's house of £517 received. Net income from fete was £1,406 (after costs and cash float used which was in May figures). Christian Aid collections raised £2,863 and sponsored Bridge Walk also raised £1,406

Work continues apace in Marketing of Finished Goods, Sewing and Knitting, Micro-Entrepreneurship (buying and selling of farm and kitchen garden products) and Coach House alternatives (literacy and health). Water Harvesting continues with the schemes already commissioned being monitored as to sustainability. Families are continuing to receive support through HIV/Aids care.

The felief in the last six months included but was not limited to food supplies, medication, clothing and education. Overall seven families and four students benefited from the above services. It is sometimes overwhelming to choose who should receive our relief given the high vulnerability among many families. Indeed, the situation is complex as far as relief resources are concerned among rural families with minimal support to Government and non-Government agencies that would otherwise help. Saidiana Women's Project believes in the power of education both formal and informal at all levels and it is really life changing.

#### ASPECTS OF OUR CHURCH ..... Harvest

**Harvest Thanksgiving Festival** is an annual celebration giving thanks to God for the harvest, the safe reaping and gathering of grain and other crops grown. In Britain it is both a Church festival and a more secular festival remembered in schools.

The practice of consecrating first-fruits to God is not a distinctly Jewish one. It seems to have sprung up naturally among agricultural peoples from the belief that the first — hence the best — yield of the earth is due to God as an acknowledgment of His gifts. "God served first", then the whole crop becomes lawful food. The offering of the first-fruits was, in Israel, regulated by laws enshrined in different parts of the Mosaic books. In Deuteronomy 18:4-5 it says "You are to give them the first fruits of your grain, new wine and olive oil, and the first wool from the shearing of your sheep..." Numbers 15:20-21 "Present a loaf from the first of your ground meal and present it as an offering from the threshing floor. Throughout the generations to come you are to give this offering to the LORD from the first of your ground meal.

Thanks have been given for successful harvests since pagan times, traditionally held on the Sunday near or of the Harvest Moon. People were encouraged to bring in produce from their garden, the allotment or farm. The food was often distributed among the poor and senior citizens of the local community, or used to raise funds for the church, or charity.

The modern British tradition of celebrating Harvest Festival in churches began in 1843. Hymns such as "We plough the fields and scatter", "Come ye thankful people, come" and "All things bright and beautiful" helping to popularize this idea and spread the annual custom of decorating churches with home-grown produce for the Harvest Service.

As British people have come to rely less heavily on home-grown produce and due to an increase in dietary requirements, there has been a shift in emphasis in many Harvest Festival celebrations. Increasingly, churches have linked Harvest with an awareness of and concern for people in the developing world for whom growing crops of sufficient quality and quantity remains a struggle, showing their concern for those in need across the globe.

This Harvest Thanksgiving in King's Park you can help by supporting Christian Aid with money or The Lodging House Mission with food stuffs or by giving flowers, which are distributed to the housebound and others within the Parish for them to enjoy. **Thanks . . .** Editor's Note: Last month's magazine intimated an anonymous thank you, apologies, it should have read:
