

KIRK SESSION REPORT

The following report covers two meetings of the Kirk Session, apart from the routine business, including Halls Allocation, forthcoming events and correspondence, specifically or interest to Elders, the following topics were discussed.

Data Protection A Church of Scotland Film concerning the Data Protection conditions and policy has been shown, and will be again, if necessary, to ensure that all Trustees understand the parameters of this policy. Worship Thanks were conveyed to all who took part in any of the services over the festive period. The Presbytery has recently approved a scheme for the selection, training and authorisation of worship leaders. The intention is to support and equip members of congregations to lead public worship on occasions when the Minister or other recognised officiant is not present. The course will run for 6 weeks and volunteers should contact Alan Pratt. Eldership A Steering Group has been raised to consider the benefits or otherwise of creating a Unitarian Committee (combined Kirk Session and Board) in King's Park. The conclusions of the group will be discussed at next month's meetings. This is part of a "Review of Eldership" to improve structure and responsibilities in the Church. Stewardship This year it will be the talents of those in our Church to promote our Stewardship Campaign. This year a card will be distributed to the Parish with details of the activities within our Church.

<u>Safeguarding</u> This is being adhered to for children and adults. Three volunteers to lead the buttercups have been ratified. A National Safeguarding Officer is in place for consultation and advice.

CONGREGATIONAL BOARD REPORT

The Financial Reports can be found elsewhere in this issue, with Gift Aid and Roof Fund donations included. The Annual Accounts are under preparation. Property with regard to the Roof Fund, application has been instituted for a grant and we await deliberations to discover if it has been successful. If so, work is likely to start in April 2019. We continue to appeal for support through the Roof Appeal Fund. Apart from the roof, routine maintenance to the toilets and Manse has been undertaken and the "dunny" cleared. Gardening the gardeners are having a break currently although consideration will be given to "refreshing" the flower beds. Work will recommence in March 2019 - can you help? Other Business Books and jigsaws keep appearing in the corridor behind the stage. Although these donations are, no doubt, given with the best of intentions, this is one area needing clearing. So, please stop as these items will be disposed of. Two new mikes have been purchased and our defibrillator has been registered with the Scottish Ambulance Service. Thanks for the donations received, and permission was granted to advertise and have a demonstration on the use of the equipment.

LIVING WITH THE BIBLE

<u>PEACE</u> - A scarce commodity nowadays! Arguments continually rage regarding territory rights, trading practices, deals, selfishness on all levels. From Government to domestic differences. This can lead to abuse, killings and wars. Attitudes, God given some might say, are competitive and this is a requirement to allow personal affiliations and goals to progress. Everybody's Right! But surely this desire to achieve can be channelled to good works and peace in the world? (Although sometimes arguments arise over how the good works are to be handled).

As with all the items in this series, the Bible can only spark contemplation in nudging thought through excerpts. In "Hark the Herald Angels Sing" the couplet "peace on earth and mercy mild, God and sinners reconciled" seems to sum up the intention with regards to wars. Isaiah 2:4 gives a possibility of peace "they will make their swords into ploughs and their spears into pruning hooks; nations will no longer fight other nations nor will they train for war any more". What are the chances today? In Matthew 5:44 "But I say to you - love your enemies. Pray for those who hurt you". In John 14:23 "If people love me they will obey my teaching" said Jesus and verse 27 "I leave you my peace, my peace I give you". In Philippians 4: 8-9 "Brothers and sisters think about the things that are good and worthy of praise.

Think about the things that are true and honourable and right and pure and beautiful and respected. Do what you learned and received from me and what I told you and you saw me do. And the God who gives peace will be with you". This surely is the guidance and the result of the Bible itself. So to conclude, the "Priests' Blessing" from Numbers 6: 24-26

"May the Lord Bless you and Keep you

May the Lord show you his kindness and have mercy on you May the Lord watch over you and give you peace".
