

Message 'fae' the Manse

Hello friends

I cannot believe that it is now just over a year since we began our faith journey together, the time has flown in. For me, it has been a very positive and encouraging year and I am thoroughly enjoying being part of the family of faith here in King's Park. As we begin our second year together, I have been looking back on our first year as well as looking forward, thinking about what lies ahead.

We know that there will be challenges, not only in our own lives perhaps, but in our shared life as a church, as we seek to adapt and relate more effectively with our community, that they too may come to experience the love and grace of Jesus in their own lives.

In thinking about the year ahead, my thoughts have turned to the prayer of St Brendan the navigator, which we prayed together at one of our Summer Church services. Brendan and many monks like him sailed across the seas in flimsy boats, not sure of what they would encounter when they arrived, if indeed they would survive the journey. Another of these monks was Columba, who settled in Iona which, over time, became a monastery that tended to people's mental, emotional, spiritual and physical wellbeing, and I know that many of you have visited Iona and some of you have shared with me how it was such a positive experience.

The monastery was noisy because it was populated by not only priests and monks but by teachers, scholars, craftsmen, artists, farmers, people who cared for sick people and animals, and children. Worship and contemplation were an integral part of that busy, community focused way of life and yet, far from being a place of escape from the world around them, theirs was a place where people were equipped to be sent out across the country, to be salt and light to the communities they encountered, which was the theme to our final Summer Church service.

As Christians, we follow in the footsteps and example of Jesus, but we also follow in the footsteps of monks like St Brendan and Columba. Their love for Jesus and for all people was such that they were willing to step away from what was comfortable and known and into the dangerous unknown.

In taking those risks, they established communities across the country where many people encountered Jesus for the first time and turned to Him because of how the Christians lived. It is because of their willingness to bring the Good News about Jesus to our country and because that Good News was passed on from generation to generation that our congregation of King's Park exists today.

So, what will we do with the baton we have been given? Will we drop it, preserve it, or run with it to pass on the good news — even at personal cost to ourselves? Will we try, like the missionaries from Iona, to do whatever it takes to keep our bearings in Christ, but engage with our community, trying all sorts of ways so that some might discover a new life through Jesus?

Can we resist the temptation to cling to the familiar and safe – to preserve what we know in the hope it will see us out, but risk there being no-one to whom we can pass on our rich legacy?

Let's take comfort in the courage of our ancestors who knew what it was to face fear of the unknown and yet press on. Let's remember also, who walked with them, giving them their courage to keep going in the dark and stormy times, and who promised, when He told the apostles to go into all the world to make disciples, he also promised that he would be with us always, to the very end of the age.

So, I wish every blessing upon you, and close with the words of the prayer from St Brendan the navigator for you to recite, meditate and reflect on in the days, weeks and months to come.

Help me to journey beyond the familiar and into the unknown. Give me the faith to leave old ways and break fresh ground with You.

Christ of the mysteries, I trust You to be stronger than each storm within me. I will trust in the darkness and know that my times, even now, are in Your hand. Tune my spirit to the music of heaven, and somehow, make my obedience count for You.

CARETAKER NEEDED


17.5 hours per week, 6 months fixed term appointment/temporary contract, commencing as soon as possible.

Main duty to keep the buildings secure, well-maintained and clean. Responsibilities will include:

- open up buildings in the morning and locking them at the end of the day, as required
- · setting up halls for lets, as required
- being on duty for hall lets, as and when required
- · carrying out basic, day to day maintenance, as and when required
- cleaning/preparing the sanctuary and adjoining rooms for worship
- setting up the sanctuary for adhoc events and services, as and when required
- making sure heating, lighting and alarm systems are working properly
- checking doors and windows are locked when the building is not in use
- adhering to the Church of Scotland's safety policies to create a safe environment for everyone

Hours of employment are 17.5 hours per week, flexible hours available, can be discussed, however there will be core days and hours during September to May. Salary £12.60 per hour.

As an update to the update in June/July's magazine, we can now confirm that the total amount raised for this year's Christian Aid Week was £2,083.50

You'll remember that this year, the Kirk Session decided that we would not deliver CA envelopes to the homes in our parish, but instead, concentrate on our own church family and friends.

Envelopes were available on the Sunday of the CAW launch for people to take away and return to church, and this along with other personal donations, raised the sum of £1,464.50.

Other memorable and successful events that took place during the week to add to the coffers and to our church family fellowship, comprise Millie & Aileen's CA Tuesday Coffee morning, raising £168, our Soup & Roll Sunday where £260.20 was donated, and finally, for our church quizzers, the 'paper' quiz and the full blown, highly competitive CA Quiz evening, from which a further £190.80 was added to the total.
