
Income: In October, to date, the Gift Weekend has raised £8,550

The graph above shows how many of the congregation (vertical scale) give within each amount range (horizontal scale) over the first half of this tax year.

133 regular Monthly Standing Orders and a 4-week average of FWO envelopes are included. For example, the second bar shows 40 donations (monthly or 4-weekly) which were more than £25 up to £45 at most.

Note that single donations are often made by couples. Remember, a donation of £20 a month, is only £5 a week! While we appreciate that, financially, because of inflation, times are not as good for us as they might have been in the past. It is the same for our church.

Our fuel bills have rocketed over the last 15 years and other expenses continue to increase. If you haven't recently increased your regular giving, we would encourage you to think about doing so.

The Finance Committee

Robert 'Bob' Pitman 19 September 1935 - 24 October 2025

Bob was born on 19th September 1935 in Larkhall. He was an older brother to sister Helen and brother Jim. When Bob was 6 months old the family moved to Ruchill where Bob eventually attended Dunard Street Primary School, then Eastpark Junior Secondary School, and left at the age of 15 with a third year leaving certificate. In January 1951, Bob began full-time work at North British Locomotive Works where he served his apprenticeship as a tool maker. The same year, he joined the 51st Glasgow Boys' Brigade Company, he went on to become a BB officer and leader of the Life Boys. He joined the Methodist Church in Maryhill Road in 1953 after attending Sunday School and Youth Fellowship.

In December 1956, Bob was called up to do his National Service in the Royal Air Force, where he served for 2 years as an Air Defence Operator. After leaving the RAF, Bob returned to North British Locomotives where in God's providence he met a young lady, Nan, who was working as a clerkess in the North British Locomotives offices. Eventually, drumming up courage, Bob asked Nan out on a date and eighteen months after that first date they were married on 14th July 1961. Bob and Nan were blessed with two sons, Kenneth, born in 1963 and Martin, born in 1970. Family have always been important to Bob and Nan and so the year 2000 was a very important year for them when Martin married his wife Vicky and Kenny married his wife Sonia. Bob and Nan's family increased over the years as they were blessed with 5 Grandchildren. Having enjoyed being doting grandparents, watching with pride as the children blossomed into fine young adults.

Bob's faith had grown and developed, having a particular gift with young people, he started a midweek club where children learned about the Christian faith. He also served as leader of the Junior Section of the Boys' Brigade and in 1981 Bob, with God's guiding hand, came into the lives of the people of King's Park Church, as the new full time Church Officer. He began his duties here in the November of that year and gave 19 years of faithful service until he reached retirement in 2000. During that time, Bob, Nan and family stayed in the Church Officer's house in Kingsbridge Drive, and after retirement, Bob and Nan moved to Calder Street, Govanhill, enjoying 25 years there. Bob was much loved and respected by all of us here at King's Park Church. For Sunday worship he was always immaculately dressed and looked upon it as his privilege to carry the Bible into the sanctuary for morning and evening worship.

During the week, Bob had the gift of getting on well with many members of the congregation with whom he came in contact. For Bob, being Church Officer was much more than just a job. The long and dedicated service that Bob gave this church, here at King's Park, continued after he retired. In March 2001, Bob was ordained as an elder and served his district for over 20 years. During this time he was an active member of the church choir, and was the choir's Treasurer. He also acted as Treasurer for many years for the Pathfinders. He was the Church Registrar and Roll-keeper for many years, as well as joining the carpet bowling club where he also become Treasurer, as well as chairman. Bob was meticulous, giving great attention to detail in everything he did. Membership rolls, organisations' finances—all of them were in safe hands. In 2021, Bob joined Overtoun Park Bowling Club and enjoyed playing outdoor bowls there until 2019. Bob enjoyed dancing in retirement and he and Nan regularly attended a Modern Sequence Dance class on a Friday evening. After moving to Calder Street, Bob also became a member of the Local Tenants' Committee and served for two years as Chairman

For several years, Croftfoot church had an adult fellowship which met on Sunday evening and Bob and Nan appreciated the Christian teaching at this fellowship, where long lasting friendships were made.

Bob's strong faith and trust in God sustained him through the last months of his life. He was restricted in the house, had short stays in hospital and depended more and more on oxygen, with Nan, his devoted wife and soulmate, always by his side. Bob was grateful to God for granting him a long, happy and fulfilling life and on 19th September he quietly celebrated his 90th birthday. There was an open door at home where many friends visited throughout the day. Bob received more than sixty birthday cards, in itself an eloquent testimony to the affection and esteem in which Bob was held by everyone who knew him.

Bob's passing from this life into God's nearer presence was peaceful. He was tired and knew that his days on earth were drawing to a close. Bob was in no pain, and Nan, as in life, was by his side when he passed away peacefully on Friday 24th October.

Well done Bob, good and faithful servant. Enter into the joy of your Lord.

May the Lord Bless you and keep you, may the Lord make his face to shine upon you, and give you peace. *Amen*.

King's Park Church recycling – a reminder

Around this time last year, the Kirk Session agreed that, rather than participating in Glasgow City Council's recycling scheme, at a cost in excess of £200 per year, we would try to recycle the relevant materials in our own domestic recycling bins, according to the rules that apply within the council area we live.

Members are encouraged to seek access to the basement (ask an office bearer, or anyone on duty in the halls) and take a bag of cans/plastic/cardboard etc home to put in your own appropriately coloured bins. Alternatively, members can also volunteer to take bagged general waste & recycling materials to Polmadie.

SEASON OF REMEMBRANCE 2025

Our season started with Stuart's very meaningful dedication of the Garden of Remembrance on Sunday 2nd November, aided by members of King's Park Brass. The garden remained open for the rest of that week, allowing anyone, who wished, to plant a little cross, as a symbol of their own personal memory, within the rope border.

In preparation for Remembrance Sunday and the church being open on the 11th day of the 11th month, the sanctuary was beautifully decorated, inside and out, thanks to Kristine & Cath – knitted poppies adorned the stone pillars, beautiful floral displays on the communion table and font, the wooden cross, appropriately adorned in poppies, a black drape and a white lily, and our banner, originally created for the Centenary of the First World War Armistice, again hung below the church's war memorial, at the south transept.

On Remembrance Day itself, the church opened its doors for a time of silent reflection, focussing on a short service of remembrance including the traditional 2 minutes silence at the 11th hour. Thanks to Stuart for leading worship, and to Gaera for organising. We say thanks once more to Cath and Faye, for their creation of the much-admired banner and for originally encouraging our church knitters in the production of the much-used and versatile poppies, again both taking their place in this important time, looking back. The number of poppies grows year on year as we need to remember those affected in more recent conflicts.

We say thanks to those who took part in this year's Act of Remembrance during worship on Sunday 9th November. To John, for his words, and to piper, drummer, and trumpeter, for lament, roll and calls respectively. In addition, we say thank you to the AV team for their sensitive choice and management of sound and image live streamed to those watching at home.

Finally, we give grateful thanks to God for the opportunity to remember, year by year, those who paid the ultimate price for our freedom.
