## **KING'S PARK BRASS - NEW YEAR UPDATE!**

The band enjoyed a well-deserved Christmas break after a busy November and December! The Senior Band kicked things off in November with our concert in Rutherglen Town Hall entitled "Storytelling". The following weekend the Junior Band played at our coffee morning in the church. This warmed them up for their trip to Perth to take part in the Scottish Youth Brass Band Championships for the first time since 2019. Congratulations to them on achieving a bronze award!

In December the Senior and Junior Bands combined for our Christmas concert in the church, while groups from the Senior Band were out and about playing carols at local supermarkets, in the park, and even at a wedding!

The Senior Band is now rehearsing for our next concert on the afternoon of Sunday 26th March, in the church, where one of the main musical offerings will be Prokofiev's 'Peter and the Wolf'. We'll be joined that afternoon by a small ensemble of young Royal Conservatoire of Scotland graduates, who will offer a different perspective on brass music!

## **CARETAKER POST**

## **BLAST FROM THE PAST**

In previous issues of the magazine, we have featured old photographs, to get folks remembering and sharing little bits of information which are fascinating and add depth to the story of our church family here in King's Park. This issue, we remember the Percussion Band.

For 21 years, youngsters in the congregation had enthusiastically joined the Percussion Band under the leadership of Mr John D Govan, but it had never been given official status as a church organisation until John offered his band to the church in June 1964. This marvellous organisation operated on strict discipline and a promotion system, members beginning in the triangle section and moving through each section to the drums. Thereafter, they each became a deputy conductor and finally a full conductor. Mr Govan started his Percussion Band when he arrived in King's Park after having been blitzed out of Dalmeir. The only instruments saved from his original band were the triangles, everything else, including his home, being totally destroyed. In two respects King's Park Percussion band was unique. Normally percussion bands were only for very young children, whereas ours catered for about forty children up to 12 years of age. This meant that more ambitious musical ventures could be tackled. The problem with this, though, was that Mr Govan and his successors had to arrange all the band parts themselves, because in those days, it was impossible to buy advanced music for percussion bands.

In another respect, too, KP Percussion Band was in a class of its own – it was the only known percussion band which was not just an offshoot of another organisation.

Mr Govan was a real character. Winter or Summer, hail rain or shine , he could be seen trudging along KP Avenue with his wee brown case. And what affection he inspired from his band! They even wrote to a national newspaper describing his work in such glowing terms that the paper presented him with a bicycle to help him carry his music and gear! A brilliant pianist, his solo spots in band concerts were much appreciated by enthusiastic audiences.

The photo displayed was taken, outside the church, in around 1948. Are you in it? Are your Mum or Dad, or Granny in it. Were you ever a member of the band? Please let the magazine team know – we'd love to hear of your experiences with the King's Park Percussion Band.

## **SMALLS FOR ALL**

The charity 'Smalls for All', a charity we have supported in the past, has reached out, asking again for donations of new pants and new or gently worn laundered bras (not sports bras or cropped tops).

Last time we collected for them, the focus was mainly on Africa, where underwear is regarded almost as a status symbol and young women, having to attend work or school during their period, are put in an unacceptable and undignified position.

This time the charity has been approached by homeless charities and schools in the UK, who are finding that men, women and children here either cannot afford underwear or just can't get pants etc for all number of reasons. Giving bras and pants seems like such a insignificant thing, but many girls and women miss school or work during their period because they have no underwear. The charity supplies underwear to homeless units and school banks in the UK, and to refugee camps across the world.

They are looking, specifically, for girls and boys' pants from age 3 years and up, and ladies and men's pants of all sizes. A large pink bucket has been placed in the foyer to the church halls for anyone to place a donation, and these will be delivered directly, on a regular basis, to Smalls for All in West Calder.

**CLUSTER UPDATE**

King's Park and Croftfoot's joint 5 years Mission Plan was submitted to presbytery on 8th December, for onward transmission to the 'Presbytery Mission Plan Implementation Group' (PMPIG) in Edinburgh for consideration. Meanwhile, we received and responded to comments made by PMPIG on a paragraph relating to KP and Croftfoot, which had been included in Carmunnock and Castlemilk's joint mission plan.

On Sunday 22nd January, we attended a meeting in Cambuslang Church of all the clusters in Zone 5 (A-D). We are 5C, and along with the rest, we were informed that PMPIG wished to see more detailed information on our objectives with regard to our mission priorities identified in the 5-year plan. To enable this to work, we (KP and Croftfoot), were advised to meet again with the rest of cluster 5C to concentrate on these objectives and priorities and identify cluster wide initiatives, all to be added to the mission plan proforma already in place - new information to be submitted to presbytery by the 21st February.

Presbytery then has until 6th March to resubmit the whole mission plan for Glasgow to PMPIG. King's Park's team are hopeful, that, with your continuing prayers for our church and our cluster partners within the wider local community, that we will be able to move forward in the near future.

In the meantime, we are extremely grateful to our Interim Moderator/Locum Ian Galloway, for his support and advice throughout this process.

Any volunteers would be part of a team, would not have to attend Kirk Session meetings, but would be an important cog in ensuring the smooth running of all the affairs of our church.
