Message 'fae' the Manse

Hello friends

Well, given the turn in the weather these past couple of weeks, it looks like summer is bidding us farewell. As the trees around us begin to change from their many shades of green to vibrant oranges, reds, browns and golds, and the fact it won't be long until we turn the clocks back an hour, reminds us that time does not stand still, and the seasons continue to roll on as we anticipate the beginning of autumn. This time of year also signals the return of students to college and university and the return of the groups that use our halls for their meetings. All these things remind us that we are constantly going through a series of endings and new beginnings, both as individuals and as a church. There is a degree of sadness when it's time to close some chapters in our lives but the excitement of looking forward to new adventures, all of which may feel a bit chaotic at times.

It was very much like that for the early church, which we can read about in Acts. It must have felt a bit chaotic for those early believers too. In such a short space of time, so much was happening. Jesus ascended back to heaven; the Holy Spirit filled the believers and the early church exploded with hundreds of people choosing to follow Jesus. Next, they discovered that when Jesus said to take the good news to the ends of the earth, he meant it, and he was including people from all corners of the known world, whether Jew or Gentile. Every day must have felt like a school day, and they would have had no idea what would happen next. We also know, however, that not everyone liked what was happening. Saul had started a campaign of terror, dragging believers from their homes and killing or imprisoning them. But Jesus turned his life around, appearing to him on the road to Damascus and, before the believers really knew what was happening, even their greatest enemy was now preaching that Jesus was the Son of God.

Keeping up with all the changes must have been no mean feat and they would have to adapt and change as they went, dividing up duties, such as appointing people to serve, others to preach, others to make policy decisions on how they would function as a group. So, in some ways, it was organised chaos, although there was a common thread

holding everything together. The people were turning up, praying together, listening out for what God, through the Holy Spirit, was telling them and responding. Each step of the way, the Holy Spirit was guiding them, teaching them and helping them. From the day the Holy Spirit filled them, nothing was ever the same again. They had spilled out of that upper room and into the world around them, changing lives and learning as they went. I sometimes wonder what would have happened if they had stayed in that upper room with their group of 120. Would we be here as believers today? I'm not so sure.

Jesus' command was to go, and the Holy Spirit led them to where they were to go. Mostly, he led them out and about in the community. They went where people gathered and, whether it was meeting someone on a road, in the marketplace, at the Jewish meeting place called the Synagogue or accepting an invitation to someone's home, they didn't stay in a holy huddle, they were out and about, turning up, listening and responding.

I have absolutely no doubt, that just as he was back then, God is at work in King's Park now, but we won't know what he's doing unless we get out there and find out. As we do, the Holy Spirit will lead us to where he wants us to be. Like the disciples, we just need to turn up, listen and respond and, as we do, we might be surprised to see that God has got there long before us. It might feel a bit like organised chaos, and we might find ourselves learning as we go, but the important part is that we go because God loves the people around us so much and wants them to know him.

We can be a part of that great adventure; sharing the great news that God doesn't just care about our community, He deeply loves everyone in it and won't turn anyone away who comes to Him. So, can we be bold enough to turn up, to listen and respond, learning as we go, and see our community transformed?


